GENERAL RULES FOR ALL EXHIBITS

- 1. All exhibitors agree to be bound by the rules and regulations of the Jacktown Fair.
- 2. The fair management reserves the right to amend or add to these rules and regulations as its judgment may determine.
- Reasonable care will be taken to protect all exhibits on display from all injury and damage, but the fair is not in any way to be held responsible for accident, loss or damage by water, fire, theft or otherwise whatever may be the cause or extent of the damage or loss.
- 4. Entries will be made according to classification.
- 5. Premiums as listed may be given for meritorious exhibits. In cases where there is no competition judges may give an award such as they deem the exhibit is worthy to receive. Same rule applies where there are fewer entries in any class than the number of premiums offered. The judges may at their discretion award a prize or prizes of such grade as the exhibit deserves.
 - The fair reserves the right to limit the number of entries by each exhibitor to two (2) per class in the case of livestock, the same breed.
 - The decision of the judges shall be final in all classes except where mistakes, fraud, mis- representation or collusion, not discovered at the time of award is proved in such cases the Superintendent, Manager or Secretary of the fair or show, or such referee as he may appoint, may make the decision with his approval. The case may be appealed to the Fair Management or Show Commission from whose decision there can be no appeal.
- 6. It shall be the responsibility of the exhibitor to make known the proper name of the article or breed of livestock he is entering. Any item entered improperly will be disqualified to receive a prize, but the judges will mark the correct name on the entry tag for the benefit of the owner so the same mistake in entering need not be made the second time.
- 7. All entries must have been grown, produced, or made since the last fair by the person whose name appears on the tag as exhibitor. If entries are to be limited to residents of the county, or to a specified area, this must be stated in the fair's Premium Book Rules Section. Any exhibitor may be required to prove ability to reproduce entry in any department in the presence of a qualified person.
- 8. Superintendents of a department reserve the right of refusing to accept any entry. Furthermore the superintendents reserve the right to bar from competition animals, vegetables, flowers, poultry, products and manufactured articles on decidedly inferior quality and those not possessing sufficient merit to warrant recognition.
- 9. The Fair Management may, at any time, order the removal of any exhibit or part of exhibit in bad condition and any article unfit to show may be excluded. Food products cannot be polluted with any substance or chemical that causes them to become poisonous and unfit to be used as food. No exhibit may be removed before the close of the fair except by consent of the management.
- 10. Every exhibit accepted for premium MUST BE GIVEN AN ENTRY TAG which must be plainly marked showing THE NAME OF THE EXHIBIT. In the case of livestock, THE BREED NAME MUST BE SHOWN ON CARDS LARGE ENOUGH THAT THE BREED NAME IS READILY IDENTIFIED BY THE VIEWERS, or IF THE LIVESTOCK IS GROUPED TOGETHER ACCORDING TO BREEDS, ONE LARGE SIGN TO DESIGNATE THE GROUP WILL BE SATISFACTORY, HOWEVER, THE AWARD WINNERS MUST BE PLACED ON THE STALL OR PEN OF THE INDIVIDUAL WINNERS FOR THE DURATION OF THE FAIR OR SHOW. Failure to comply with this regulation WILL RESULT IN FORFEITURE OF PREMIUMS. It will be the duty of

- the fair or show officials to see that this regulation is complied with. Where award ribbons are stolen or destroyed, the exhibitor may receive a duplicate at the close of the fair or show which shall be supplied by the fair free of charge.
- 11. During the judging, buildings, except livestock arenas, are to be closed to everyone except fair officials, judges, and necessary attendants. No exhibitor or his agent shall communicate with the judge during time of determining the awards except to answer questions proposed by the judges. Any exhibitor interfering with the judges while making award shall forfeit any premium to which he would otherwise be entitled.
- 12. All livestock offered for premiums must be the property of the owners thirty (30) days or longer.
- 13. No person shall be allowed in the ring while stock is being judged except judge, superintendents, and necessary attendants.
- 14. Should any animal awarded a prize be disqualified, the animals gaining the lower prizes shall move into the next higher position if in the opinion of the judges, the animals are worthy of such prizes.
- 15. Overfitting of cattle will be discriminated against. Any artificial means used to change the form or shape of an animal will disqualify it from competition.
- 16. When on exhibition in the ring, each animal must be under halter and in charge of owner or employee.
- 17. Joint ownership considered to be as one owner in accordance with registration papers.
- 18. Competitors for the premiums on stock must make their entries with the Jacktown Fair. All entries of livestock close Tuesday, July 1, 2025. All entry fees are to be paid when entries are made.
- 19. In case of unfavorable weather, the Richhill Agricultural Society reserves the right to cancel any events, premiums, or prizes.
- 20. Richhill Agricultural Society will not be responsible for any personal or property damages.
- 21. No intoxicating drinks allowed on the grounds during the fair.
- 22. Livestock must be on the grounds until 8:30 PM, on the last day of the Fair.
- 23. Entries in the Home and Garden Hall will be accepted on Sunday, July 13, 2:00 PM to 7:00 PM. Judging will take place Monday, July 14.
- 24. No articles to be taken from the Home and Garden Hall until Sunday. Hall will be open Sunday, July 23, from 1:00 PM to 3:00 PM for pick-up.
- 25. The Fair Board reserves the right to request the removal from the grounds of any animal, exhibit, display, or person that it determines to be harmful or undesirable to the public.

GENERAL LIVESTOCK EXHIBIT RULES

- 1. All animals entered must compete and be shown.
- In no case is it permissible to show mixed breeds in the same class or division to be judged against each other for premiums.
- 3. The Fair reserves the right to refuse any or all entries.
- 4. Exhibitors will be expected to display or parade their animals as directed by the Superintendent; to accept the stall assigned without controversy; to keep their animals in an attractive appearance, and to cooperate with the Department in every way that may serve to increase the educational value of the show.
- 5. Exhibitors of livestock must inform themselves as to when their stock will be judged. Stock must be in the ring promptly on call and a failure to comply with the order renders exhibitors liable to be ruledout of competing.
- Decorations with ribbons or ornaments previously won by animals at shows shall be prohibited until after the awards have been made in their respective classes by the judges.
- Exhibitors must have all animals listed for competition on the grounds not later than Tuesday, at 10:00AM Arrival time is Monday 1:00 PM - 9:00 PM, Tuesday 8:00 AM - 10::00 AM
- 8. The exhibitors will be expected to keep the space they occupy in a clean and sanitary condition and to remove all their equipment promptly as the Superintendent may direct.
- 9. When on exhibition in the ring, each animal must be under halter and in charge of owner or owner's representative.
- 10. Junior exhibitors may receive assistance from adults when exhibiting their animals.
- 11. Any animal of unthrifty nature, unsuitable condition, or which cannot be satisfactorily handled under show conditions must be removed from the fair grounds.
- 12. 4-H Club or FFA members must be present and have charge of their animals at the time of judging.
- 13. Each exhibitor is limited to a maximum of 2 entries in each individual class and 1 entry in each group class.
- 14. Animals included in any group class must have competed in an individual class.
- 15. The "Other" breed category under Beef Cattle & Sheep is for exhibitors of recognized breeds that are not identified by a listed breed category. These breeds will be assigned a letter and listed in futureyears' books.
- 16. All market and feeder class, steers and lambs will be weighed at the fairground on Tuesday morning at 10:00 AM to determine class assignments. All market rabbits and goats will be weighed at a time established by their respective clubs.
- 17. All such animals remain on the premises until 8:30 PM, on the last day of the fair, unless released by the Superintendent. Exhibitors may not begin to tear down their stall decorations and partitions until Saturday, July 19, at 6:00 PM
- 18. Before departing, all exhibitors are required to move all bedding to the center aisle behind their assigned stalls. Additionally, sheep and goat exhibitors shall tear down assigned pens and move gates to areas as directed by livestock superintendents. All rabbit exhibitors shall assist in the tear down of rabbit pens as directed by club leaders.

2025 FOREIGN ANIMAL DISEASE ALERT FOR EXHIBITORS AT PENNSYLVANIA FAIRS

As a result of heightened awareness of security in the United States, foreign animal disease (FAD) surveillance is being increased nationwide. We encourage each of you to be particularlyaware of any indication that could signal the occurrence of a highly contagious disease or any other unusual or unexplained adverse animal health event. No potential cases of foreign animal disease should be ignored.

Potential hoaxes should be treated as real threats until proven otherwise. Special attention should be directed at farms and other areas where there are large number of livestock and poultry.

Be particularly alert to these five signs:

- 1. Sudden, unexplained death loss in the heard or flock.
- 2. Severe illness affecting a high percentage of the animals.
- 3. Blistering around an animal's mouth, nose, teats, or hooves.
- 4. Unusual ticks or maggots.
- 5. Staggering, falling, or central nervous system disorders.

If you see something unusual, alert the Fair Superintendent at the fair office.

BIOSECURITY CHECKLIST FORLIVESTOCK EXHIBITORS

- No visitors from a country that has animals infected with Foot and Mouth Disease have visited my farm within the previous 30 days.
- Veterinary health inspections and health certificates are current for all the animals I will be taking to the fair.
- All equipment, such as buckets, pitchforks, shovels, rakes, wheelbarrows, manurebaskets, lead ropes, halters, nose rings, snares, clippers, scissors, brushes, etc., have been cleaned and disinfected before entering the fairgrounds. (A solution of household bleach in water is recommended for disinfection purposes: add 2 gallons of bleach to 3 gallons of water for disinfecting equipment).
- I have received a list of the recommended biosecurity precautions that I should follow after returning to the farm with the animals that were taken to the fair.
- Any livestock showing signs of illness, including signs that suggest infection with Foot and Mouth Disease, will be reported immediately to the Livestock Superintendent of the fair.
- Any questions about disease and biosecurity measures can be directed to the regional veterinarian or animal health inspector, who will be visiting the fairgrounds for daily inspections.

Animal Health Requirements and Recommendations

Pennsylvania Cattle:

Requirements:

- 1. Cattle shall be identified by an official ear tag or other unique identification device approved by PDA. Official identification includes:
 - A USDA-issued National Uniform Eartagging System (NUES) ear tag having a US shield \$\overline{\mathbf{US}}\$; or
 - A 15 digit Animal Identification Number (AIN) ear tag starting with "840" and having a US shield **US**: or
 - Other identification approved by the PDA (brands and breed registrations with tattoos are not acceptable).

Recommendations:

- 1. Certificate of Veterinary Inspection (CVI) issued after May 1, 2025.
- 2. All animals must be free of evidence of infectious and contagious diseases and a statement of this should be written on the CVI.
- 3. A current rabies vaccination administered by a licensed veterinarian for animals 3 months of age and older (observe appropriate slaughter withdraw time).
- 4. Rodeo: It is recommended that rodeo cattle of all ages be negative on an official tuberculin test within 60 days prior to the start of the fair unless they are members of and originate from an accredited tuberculosis-free herd. The cattle can be accompanied by the negative test report or the tuberculosis test results can be recorded by the veterinarian on a CVI.

Out Of State Cattle:

Requirements:

- 1. Federal regulations (USDA) require a Certificate of Veterinary Inspection (CVI) issued within the 30 days prior to the date of importation.
- 2. Vesicular Stomatitis (VS): This applies to cattle entering Pennsylvania from states that experienced a Vesicular Stomatitis outbreak in the last 12 months. In these cases, an accredited veterinarian shall determine whether the animals are free from VS, and animals shall be accompanied by a CVI with the following statement signed by the accredited veterinarian: "All animals identified on this CVI have been examined and found to be free from VS. During the past 90 days, these animals have neither been exposed to VS nor were located within 10 miles of a site where VS has been diagnosed."
- 3. All animals must be free of evidence of infectious and contagious diseases and a statement of this is required on the CVI.
- 4. Federal regulation (USDA) requires individual official animal identification. Official ID will have a US shield **US** and includes:
 - · A USDA-issued National Uniform Eartagging System (NUES) tag; or
 - A 15-digit Animal Identification Number (AIN) ear tag starting with "840"; or
 - Other official identification approved by USDA. (brands and breed registrations with tattoos are not acceptable).
- 5. Tuberculosis testing requirements:
 - No test is required for animals originating from states or zones designated as accredited free by the USDA.
 - All animals originating from states or zones designated modified accredited advanced by the USDA must be test negative within the 60 days prior to the date of importation. The negative test results and dates of tests must be included on the CVI or the animal must be accompanied by a negative test report (a copy of the original report is acceptable).

- All animals originating from states or zones designated modified accredited by the USDA must originate from herds in which all animals 12 months of age and older are test negative within the 12 months prior to the date of importation and the individual animals (all ages) to be imported are also test negative within the 60 days prior to the date of importation and at least 60 days after the negative whole herd test was completed. The negative test results and date of test must be included on the CVI or the animal must be accompanied by a neg- ative test report (a copy of the original test report is acceptable).
- Special Tuberculosis Test requirement for Rodeo Cattle. All rodeo cattle and bison from out of state must be negative on an official tuberculosis test within 60 days prior to entering Pennsylvania unless they originate from and are members of an Accredited Tuberculosis-free herd within an accredited Tuberculosis-free state or zone. This requirement for rodeo cattle from out of state is in addition to all other requirements listed above for out of state cattle.

Recommendations:

1. A current rabies vaccination administered by a licensed veterinarian is recommended for animals 3 months of age and older (observe appropriate slaughter withdraw time).

Pennsylvania Equine:

Requirements:

The Department of Agriculture has no specific requirements for Pennsylvania equines at fairs. However, fair management has the authority to impose requirements designed to prevent the spread of contagious diseases.

Recommendations:

- 1. A Certificate of Veterinary Inspection (CVI) issued after May 1, 2025.
- 2. All animals must be free of evidence of infectious and contagious diseases and a statement of this should be written on the CVI.
- 3. All equine animals must be test negative for Equine Infectious Anemia (EIA) by an official test with- in the 12 months prior to the opening date of the exhibition. Laboratory test results must accompany each animal to its final destination (a copy of the original lab report is acceptable). The CVI shall specify the date of sample collection and EIA test results. Foals less than six months of age accompanied by a test-negative dam are exempt from EIA testing requirements. If the foal is not accompanied by the dam, a copy of the dam's test results must accompany the foal to its final destination.
- 4. A current rabies vaccination administered by a licensed veterinarian for animals 3 months of age and older.

Out Of State Equine:

Requirements:

- 1. A Certificate of Veterinary Inspection (CVI) issued within the 30 days prior to the date of importation.
- 2. Vesicular Stomatitis (VS) statement: This applies to horses entering Pennsylvania from states that experienced a Vesicular Stomatitis outbreak in the last 12 months. In these cases an accredited veterinarian shall determine whether the animals are free from VS, and animals shall be accompanied by a CVI with the following statement signed by the accredited veterinarian: "All animals identified on this CVI have been examined and found to be free from VS. During the past 90 days, these animals were not located within 10 miles of a site where VS has been diagnosed."
- 3. All animals must be free of evidence of infectious and contagious diseases and a statement of this is required on the CVI.
- 4. All equine animals must test negative for Equine Infectious Anemia (EIA) by an official

test within the 12 months prior to the date of importation. Laboratory test results must accompany each animal to its final destination (a copy of the original lab report is acceptable). The CVI shall specify the date of sample collection and EIA test results. Foals under six months of age accompanied by a dam with negative EIA official test results are exempt from EIA testing requirements. If the foal is not accompanied by the dam, a copy of the dam's test results must accompany the foal to its final destination.

5. If an equine animal has resided in Texas or New Mexico for a cumulative total of 30 days or more within the six months preceding the date of entry into the Commonwealth, that animal must be test-negative for Babesia caballi and Theilleria equi on a competitive enzyme-linked immunosorbent assay (c-ELISA) test, or a Department-approved equivalent test, with the test occurring within the 30 days preceding entry into Pennsylvania. The date of test and the test results shall be written on the Certificate of Veterinary Inspection.

Recommendations:

1. A current rabies vaccination administered by a licensed veterinarian for animals 3 months of age and older.

Pennsylvania Goats:

Requirements:

- 1. Individual official animal identification is required for all goats. Official ID includes:
 - A USDA ear tag with a US shield US; or
 - A legible tattoo with herd and individual identification recognized in an approved USDA Scrapie database a.k.a. scrapie tattoo (only for herds enrolled in the USDA Voluntary Scrapie Herd Certification Program); or
 - A breed registration tattoo if the animal is accompanied by a registration certificate and the tattoo is legible.

Recommendations:

- 1. A Certificate of Veterinary Inspection (CVI) issued after May 1, 2025.
- 2. All animals must be free of evidence of infectious and contagious diseases and a statement of this should be written on the CVI.

Out Of State Goats:

Requirements:

- 1. Federal regulations (USDA) require a Certificate of Veterinary Inspection (CVI) issued within the 30 days prior to the date of importation.
- 2. Vesicular Stomatitis (VS) statement: This applies to states that experienced a VS outbreak in the last 12 months. In these cases an accredited veterinarian shall determine whether the animals are free from VS, and animals shall be accompanied by a CVI with the following statement signed by the accredited veterinarian: "All animals identified on this CVI have been examined and found to be free from VS. During the past 90 days, these animals were not located within 10 miles of a site where VS has been diagnosed."
- 3. All animals must be free of evidence of infectious and contagious diseases and a statement of this is required on the CVI.
- 4. Individual official animal identification is required for all goats. Official ID includes:
 - A USDA ear tag with a US shield US; or
 - A legible tattoo with herd and individual identification recognized in an approved USDA Scrapie database a.k.a. scrapie tattoo (only for herds enrolled in the USDA Voluntary Scrapie Herd Certification Program); or
 - A breed registration tattoo if the animal is accompanied by a registration certificate and the tattoo is legible.

- 5. Tuberculosis testing requirements:
 - No test is required for animals originating from states or zones designated as accredited-free by the USDA.
 - All animals originating from states or zones designated modified accredited advanced by the USDA must be test negative within the 60 days prior to the date of importation. The negative test results and date of test must be included on the CVI or the animal must be accompanied by a negative test report (a copy of the original report is acceptable).
 - All animals originating from states or zones designated modified accredited must originate from herds in which all animals 12 months of age and older have tested negative within the 12 months prior to the date of importation; and the individual animals (all ages) to be imported have also tested negative within the 60 days prior to the date of importation and at least 60 days after the negative whole herd test was completed. The negative test results and date of test must be included on the CVI or the animal must be accompanied by a negative test report (a copy of the original test report is acceptable).

For Sale Goats:

Requires a specific set of information that needs to be included to their sales slips (many already contain most information required) which travel with the goat to any final destination - including slaughter, as a movement record. A copy of those records will need to be kept and retained for a period of 5 years to meet the requirements of the new federal scrapie rules.

Pennsylvania Rabbits:

Requirements:

The Department of Agriculture has no specific requirements for Pennsylvania rabbits at fairs. However, fair management has the authority to impose requirements designed to prevent the spread of contagious diseases.

Recommendations:

- 1. A Certificate of Veterinary Inspection (CVI) issued after May 1, 2025.
- 2. All animals must be free of evidence of infectious and contagious diseases.

Out Of State Rabbits:

Must follow PDA import requirements if coming from a state in which Rabbit hemorrhagic disease has been diagnosed within the last twelve months - and if so will require a Certificiate Of Veterinary Inspection with specific requirements and statements added. In addition, feed, trailers, forages, tack, or materials associated with known affected rabbits or premises may not enter the commonwealth. This CVI requirement does not apply to rabbits coming from states where RHD has not been diagnosed with the last 12 months.

Requirements:

The Department of Agriculture has no specific requirements for out of state rabbits at fairs. However, fair management has the authority to impose requirements designed to prevent the spread of contagious diseases.

Recommendations:

- 1. A Certificate of Veterinary Inspection (CVI) issued within 30 days prior to the date of importation.
- 2. A statement on the CVI attesting that all rabbits listed on the CVI are free of signs of infectious and contagious disease.

Pennsylvania Sheep:

Requirements:

- 1. Individual official animal identification is required for all sheep. Official ID includes:
 - A USDA ear tag with a US shield US; or
 - A legible tattoo with herd and individual identification recognized in an approved USDA Scrapie database a.k.a. a scrapie tattoo (only for flocks enrolled in the USDA Voluntary Scrapie Flock Certification Program); or
 - A breed registration tattoo if the animals are accompanied by a registration certificate (copy acceptable) and the tattoo is legible.

Recommendations:

- 1. A Certificate of Veterinary Inspection (CVI) issued after May 1, 2025.
- 2. All animals must be free of evidence of infectious and contagious diseases and a statement of this should be written on the CVI.
- 3. A current rabies vaccination administered by a licensed veterinarian for animals 3 months of age and older (observe appropriate slaughter withdraw time).

Out Of State Sheep:

Requirements:

- 1. Federal regulation (USDA) requires a Certificate of Veterinary Inspection (CVI) issued within the 30 days prior to entry into PA.
- 2. Vesicular Stomatitis (VS) Statement: This applies to states that experienced a VS outbreak in the last 12 months. In these cases, an accredited veterinarian shall determine whether the animals are free from VS, and animals shall be accompanied by a CVI with the following statement signed by the accredited veterinarian: "All animals identified on this CVI have been examined and found to be free from VS. During the past 90 days, these animals were not located within 10 miles of a site where VS has been diagnosed."
- 3. All animals must be free of evidence of infectious and contagious diseases and a statement of this is required on the CVI.
- 4. Individual official USDA scrapie animal identification is required. Official scrapie ID includes:
 - A USDA ear tag with a US shield ;or
 - A legible tattoo with herd and individual identification recognized in an approved USDA Scrapie database a.k.a. a scrapie tattoo (only for flocks enrolled in the USDA Voluntary Scrapie Flock Certification Program; or
 - A breed registration tattoo if the animals are accompanied by a registration certificate (copy acceptable) and the tattoo is legible.

Recommendations:

1. A current rabies vaccination administered by a licensed veterinarian for animals 3 months of age and older (observe appropriate slaughter withdraw time).

For Sale Sheep:

Requires a specific set of information that needs to be included to their sales slips (many already contain most information required) which travel with the sheep to any final destination - including slaughter, as a movement record. A copy of those records will need to be kept and retained for a period of 5 years to meet the requirements of the new federal scrapie rules.

The goal of the PA Preferred® Baking Contest is to encourage young people across the Commonwealth to participate in Pennsylvania's agricultural fairs by showcasing Pennsylvania grown and produced products in their contest entries.

RULES:

- Open to any individual amateur baker (ages 8 through 18 at the time of the fair's contest) who is a Pennsylvania resident. One entry per person.
- 2. Entrants may NOT have won 1st place in this PA Preferred® Junior Baking contest at any other fair in 2025.
- 3. Entry must be six (6) individual sized portions of the baked entry item (cookies, brownies or bars).
- The Cookies, Brownies or Bars, and any fillings and frostings, must be made from scratch with edible ingredients.
 No pre-packaged ingredients may be used (ex: no pre-made mixes, cookie dough, pie crust, frosting, etc.).

 Any decorations must just be edible.
- At least two (2) PA Préferred[®] or locally produced ingredients must be used in the recipe. Some examples of qualifying ingredients include grains (such as oats or flour), butter, milk, eggs, fruits and/or vegetables.
- A PA Preferred® logo is <u>not</u> required because not all PA Preferred® products carry the label. The name of the ingredient and the source is sufficient (see attached example). Contact <u>RA-AGPAPreferred@pa.gov</u> for any assistance with qualifying ingredients.
- Entry must be submitted for judging on a food safe disposable setting. (All pans, plates and dishes are considered to be disposable and will not be returned.)
- The PA Preferred® entry and its recipes will become the property of the Fair or PA Farm Show and will not be returned.
- 9. Recipe(s) must be submitted with the entry, printed on one side of 8-1/2" x 11" sheets of paper. Recipe must list all ingredients, quantities, and the preparation instructions. The name of each PA Preferred* ingredient or locally produced ingredient must be clearly listed along with the name of the source that made/grew the product (ex: PA Preferred Milk- Galliker's brand; or Apples Smith Farm Orchard). Entrant's name, age, address and phone number must be printed on the back side of all the pages.
- 10. Refrigeration is <u>not</u> available at the fair or PA Farm Show. Entries that require refrigeration after baking must indicate so in the recipe. Those entries will not be sold, auctioned or otherwise distributed for consumption after judging for food safety reasons.

- c. Be sure to pick a perfect specimen, then select the others as similar to it as possible. Never mix specimens of different maturity.
- d. Protect from dirt, disease, infection, and mechanical damage. Select specimens that are perfect and show no blemishes of any kind.
- e. Condition and maturity. Be sure that exhibits are of high quality.
- f. Potatoes should not be washed. Remove soil using a soft cloth or brush.
- g. Tomatoes should have stems removed. Carrots, beets, etc. should have tops (leaves) removed from vegetables leaving about (2) two inches of stems.
- Read premium material, carefully following all rules and regulations. If an entry calls for five specimens, be sure to exhibit that number; do not enter four or six. Your exhibits will be disgualified for having a number of specimens other than that stipulated.
